
# **HOMO sapienne**

A sensational debut novel about love, sexuality, youth and identity in Nuuk by one of Greenland's new literary stars. *HOMO sapienne* has attracted international acclaim and an interview with the author was published by The New Yorker. The novel was nominated for the Nordic Council Literature Prize 2015.

All of this makes the burgeoning literary success of Niviaq Korneliussen, a twenty-seven-year-old Greenlandic author, a turning point in the island's literary history. Korneliussen's début novel, "Homo Sapienne," published in 2014, is a work of a strikingly modern sensibility — a stream-of-consciousness story of five queer protagonists confronting their identities in twenty-first-century Greenlandic culture.

### **Zombieland**

Zombieland offers very little comfort to the reader. Violent events affecting already vulnerable people provide the turning point for Sørine Steenholdt's powerful short story anthology, which can be read as sharp social critique. These semi-biographical stories feature people who have given up on life and are living zombie-like existences. All of them are damaged in some way – some are cowed and live at the mercy of other people, while others have hardened and survive because they show no weakness, but neither can they love or be loved.



# She stands in the north wind (Hun står i nordenvind)

Ten short stories, poems and illustrations by Nordic artists come together in a mosaic about Nordic identity and female lives: Helga, Maalia, Lulu, Anna, Gudska and five other women who live in Greenland, Iceland, the Faroe Islands and Denmark. The short stories about them are snapshots of modern women's lives, feelings and relationships. In Ella an exquisite dinner

is prepared for a group of friends, but the friends' time together is characterised by emptiness and superficiality. In Gudska, a Faroese woman dreams of a better world for herself – and for the environment. In Karla a childhood doll keeps a woman company through different stages of her life.

Nina Kreutzmann Jørgensen delivers sharp observations of the banality of everyday life, produces fine observations of natural changes in the Nordic topography and reveals a thorough knowledge of the complexity of coupledom.

## **Frozen Evidence (Frosne Beviser)**

Sika Haslund is a typical modern Greenlandic woman with roots in Greenland and Denmark. She has recently returned to the country of her birth after many years abroad to work as communication consultant for the business and tourism agency, Go Greenland.


Her arrival coincides with the outbreak of an epidemic and several deaths in Greenland's second-largest town, Sisimiut. By chance Sika becomes involved in the case and discovers that a past event links several of the deaths.

Frozen Evidence /Frosne beviser was awarded the 2017 Debutant Diploma by the Danish Crime Writers' Association.



Local colour and cultural history are added extras, the plot creepily plausible with plenty of atmosphere and ordinary people taking the starring roles.

# **The Black Angel (Den Sorte Engel)**

A stand-alone sequel to Frozen Evidence /Frosne Beviser. A man is found murdered on board an abandoned fishing boat off the coast of Uummannaq in North Greenland. In the hull police find a large number of polar bear pelts as well as narwhal and walrus tusks. Is this a case of poaching and smuggling? Greenpeace protests loudly and Sika Haslund and Go Greenland get involved in the case as it goes viral in the global media with potential catastrophic consequences for Greenland's reputation. Others, however, also have an interest in Greenland's natural resources...

Two further volumes are currently planned for the Sika-series.


# If you whistle at the northern lights (Hvis du fløjter efter nordlyset)

Greenland has recently achieved home rule, and in other parts of the Arctic the desire for political independence grows as new oil fields are discovered.

The Alaskan Inuit, Amaroq, takes Bjørn on a breath-taking journey into this world – a journey which will have fatal consequences for Bjørn's future, for his relationship with love – and his own conscience.

With Helms operating the literary tiller, you can be sure of an enjoyable introduction to thoughts and experiences of the beautiful Arctic, which can conceal so many lies, spin and intrigues that you think it's all a – well, a lie. 

Oscar K. Sonne, a young civil servant with Denmark's Foreign Ministry, is sent to Nairobi to bring back the body of a young Greenlandic man who was murdered in a park. The case turns out to be much more than the killing of a naive westerner who fell for a local honey trap. The murdered Masaana was more than love-struck – he was also a dedicated engineering student from Thule in northernmost Greenland, who had discovered a terrible secret about the ruthless exploitation of his home country. Oskar is soon in over his head in international intrigues.

Thule is back on the radar in a brilliant political thriller from Greenland.

Aima Shush! was nominated for The Nordic Council Literature Prize for Children and Young Adults 2016.





# The Man in the Moon and other stories from Greenland


(Månemanden og andre fortællinger fra Grønland)





What does life look like in a small Greenlandic village when its existence is threatened by depopulation?



Beautiful landscapes, hunting trips, dog sledging, but especially people make up his subjects. In parallel with his pictures Henrik Saxgren tells the

personal stories of some of the individual inhabitants.
